O Lord, how manifold are your works!
In wisdom you have made them all;
the earth is full of your creatures.
Yonder is the sea, great and wide,
creeping things innumerable are there,
living things both great and small.
These all look to you to give them their food in due season;
when you give to them they gather it up,
when you open your hand, they are filled with good things
Psalm 104:24-28

The timeless beauty of the psalmist's poetry is especially fitting as we enter the autumn harvest season. The ancient writer perceived the providential hand of God at work in the wondrous diversity of life, the vastness of the sea, and the ordered rhythms of nature. It is a vision of the wonder of God's sacred creation – a vision we need in our time.

In October we remember another poet of creation's wonder, St. Francis of Assisi. In his song, "All Creatures of our God and King," Francis recognized the beauty and bounty of creation as the revelation of God's grandeur and goodness:

Sing brother wind, with clouds and rain you grow the gifts of fruit and grain: Alleluia, alleluia!

Dear sister water, useful, clear make music for your Lord to hear.

The last lines praising water, "useful, clear" have a particular resonance in our own central California region and the experience of drought. It also serves as a reminder of the larger global environmental crisis in this time of climate change and the loss of species. These threats to creation are the results of the excesses of our way of life and an indictment of our failure to be good stewards of God's creation.

But there is another path. Implied in both the psalmist's and Francis' words is the promise that if we look at our world with the eyes of wonder and faith, we will perceive the providential presence of God. Just as the manifold diversity of God's creation is a testament to God's wisdom, so in wisdom, God created us. As we sing each Sunday in preparation for the meal we call "Holy Communion," we join with wind and sea, sun and moon, with earth and all her creatures, in a great, unending hymn of praise. Seeing ourselves as one with all God's creatures becomes the transforming vision empowering us to be good stewards of God's creation.

THE JOURNEY FORWARD

To God be the glory, great things are happening at Mount Carmel. Kudos to the Synod Bishop for understanding our needs, and for sending us Pastor Richard to address those needs. Through his guidance and leadership, we have made major progress, in just nine short months. As soon as he finds that magic watch which is in a box in his garage, we can give him a dollar for it and it will always be a reminder of his excellent sermons. (Smile).

On the fourth Sunday of September, the Journey Forward Team held the fifth Adult Forum on Healthy Habits. The focus was on the last two healthy habits, accept decisions processed well, and loving accountably.

Pastor Richard led the discussion based on three different scenarios from Acts which were problem solving venues, There was a healthy discussion of each scenario and how each one identified the issue to be solved, and the methods used to achieve positive resolution.

There was also discussion on comparing the healthy habits grammar with the vision and mission statements to ensure that they are compatible and clearly stated. The team will be working on that over the next month.

The team will also be preparing a brief survey regarding the health of the congregation. The survey will be presented to the congregation on October 13th and will be a barometer check on how well the congregation has healed over the past fifteen months.

The results of the survey will be shared at the last Forum on October 27th. The team will also be sponsoring OKTOBERFEST. We will be upping the refreshments from donuts to hearty German fare. Please mark your calendar now and plan to attend. A good time will be held by all.

The book for October is *Orphan Train* by Christina Baker Kline. Copies are available for checkout in the church office.

Between 1854 and 1929, so-called orphan trains ran regularly from the cities of the East Coast to the farmlands of the Midwest, carrying thousands of abandoned children whose fates would be determined by pure luck. Vivian Daly, an Irish immigrant, was one such child. Returning to Maine later in life, she lives a quiet life and packs vestiges of her turbulent past away in the attic.

Seventeen-year-old Molly Ayer is a Penobscot Indian raised in foster homes. As she helps Vivian clean out her attic and sort through her possessions, they discover they aren't as different as they appear.

Moving between contemporary Maine and Depressionera Minnesota, *Orphan Train* is a powerful tale of upheaval and resilience, second chances, and unexpected friendship.

20 + years ago our Southwest California Synod of the ELCA

started a Mission Church idea which would reach out to Spanish speaking folks. The pastors and Congregations of our conference welcomed this Mission Church idea and Iglesia luterana Santa Cruz was born. Santa Cruz opened its doors in 2001, reaching out to many. Some of the people were farm field workers in the Santa Maria area. Today for almost 18 years Santa Cruz or Holy Cross church has grown. They continue to reach out serving the spiritual and physical needs of many. A large number of their membership are field workers and their families.

As Fall and winter seasons approach weather changes and field work ends. Because field workers don't have a salary coming in to support their families they rely on their Church Pantry to tide them over until field work begins again. This is where we at Mount Carmel can be a big help. Part of our goal as a church is to reach out into the community to serve others. For the month of October we are collecting specific food items to replenish Santa Cruz food pantry. Following is a list of foods the social action team invite you to bring.

October 6th = bags of dried beans only, Pinto or red beans. No canned beans please.

October 13th = bags of dried white rice only. No fancy gourmet mixes please.

October 13th = Coat donations.

October 20th = Maseca (corn flour), not cornmeal. And all-purpose (wheat flour), white or unbleached.

October 27th = large bags of small size pasta.




