The Lenten season that began a few weeks back with the imposition of ashes recalls the biblical account of creation where God bends low to breathe the breath of life into dirt molded into the human form. In the verses that follow the humans seek to "become like God," and despite God's prohibition, eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil. According to Rev. Tom Chittick, the meaning of the story is not that we are not spiritual enough, but "that we don't trust God's earthiness enough." We humans yearn for more than what creation grants us. As Chittick writes: "We want somehow to be different than who and what we are. . . . In the final analysis the origin of sin is our refusal to let God be God. . . . We want to be like God, not so much in character as in power. We lust for control and for knowledge."

In light of this, we might say that the purpose of the Lenten season that begins with the pronouncement "Remember you are dust and to dust you will return," is not so much to make us more spiritual, but to remind us of our creatureliness, of our limits and, most of all, our need for God. In the words of a hymn from John Bell of the Iona community:

Because the world is beautiful, and beauty is a tender thing, and we are stewards of creation, we need you, God.
We need you, God.

Because human knowledge seems endless, And we do not know what we do not know. We need you, God. We need you, God.

Because we cannot live without you and are free to go against you, and could worship our wisdom alone, we need you, God.
We need you, God.

In this Lenten season we are called to recognize the truth of who and what we are: not God, but God's creatures – limited, earthly and loved. And in recognizing this we are opened to hear the deepest truth of the Easter message:

Because you came among us, and sat beside us, and healed our pain and let us wound you, And love us to the end.
And triumphed over all our hatred, we need you, God.
We need you, God.

SLO Food Bank, honored to serve all of SLO County From Garret Olson, CEO

Dear Mt. Carmel,

Your entire team at the SLO Food Bank wishes you and your loved ones a happy and healthy start to 2021. We are heartened by the hard work of our local Public Health officials and the medical providers, first responders, and volunteers supporting our regional vaccination effort. Like you, we look forward to future days enriched with unmasked smiles, hugs among friends, the sound of laughter emanating from school playgrounds, and more opportunities to gather and support our local businesses throughout SLO County.

We are committed to rebuilding our vibrant county, and we will continue to share how your ongoing support of the SLO Food Bank meaningfully improves the lives of our neighbors in need. Over the next few months, though, we would like to reflect on **our countywide effort to alleviate hunger.** As you may know, the formal name of the SLO Food Bank is the "Food Bank Coalition of San Luis Obispo County," and while we transitioned from that mouthful of a name to one that rolls off the tongue more easily, the <u>County</u> aspect of our mission is as strong as ever. As we look back on our

service record, the data from last year demonstrates our countywide dedication. The two regions that received the greatest volume of nutritional assistance are at the opposite ends of our county: we provided 62,592 meals per month to residents in the northern region* of SLO County and 63,411 meals per month to residents in the southern region of SLO County! In the central region, we provided 39,005 meals per month, and the north coast was provided 30,528 meals per month!

When all said and done, the SLO Food Bank distributed **over five million pounds of food in 2020.** We offered these 195,536 monthly meals through three primary distribution methods: direct services, agency partnerships, and home deliveries. Every month, SLO Food Bank trucks and staff provided direct-to-client food relief at 60 distribution sites throughout the county. Patrons of these distribution sites receive fresh-picked produce and nutritious staple foods from our dedicated staff and volunteers. We also helped stock the pantry shelves and community kitchens of our 83 nonprofit agency partners that serve San Miguel, Nipomo, and every community in between. These agency partnerships make up the bulk of our hunger relief efforts and are vital to our mission. Finally, we deliver essential groceries to the doorsteps of isolated and homebound seniors. This incredible effort is part of a collaboration with two other local nonprofits-Wilshire Community Services and RideOn Transportation-and representative of the SLO Food Bank's continuous pursuit to identify and creatively alleviate the hunger challenges faced by our community.

Regardless of what region of San Luis Obispo County you call home, when you support the SLO Food Bank, you are supporting health and hope in your own neighborhood! Local donors account for over 70% of our annual operating budget—that's you! Every dollar you give provides us with the resources to nourish seven otherwise empty tummies. Thank you for supporting our countywide mission. You are making a difference in your community!

*For purposes of this breakdown, the northern region includes the non-coastal regions north of the Cuesta Grade and the central valley, the southern region includes all communities south of Avila Beach, the central region includes Avila Beach, Edna Valley, and the City of San Luis Obispo, and the north coast includes Baywood, Los Osos, Morro Bay, Cayucos, Cambria, and San Simeon.



### A brief history...

Her church served a very marginalized community of mostly Mexican immigrants that have minimal education, speak Spanish and a native Mayan language, and have an indigenous culture. Many work in agriculture. The grace of Christ touched their hearts and lives and continues to do so after Patricia retired in 2016.

Pastor Esteban Salazar was called to IL Santa Cruz after an interim period and currently serves there with his wife Angie. Mt. Carmel is honored to be one of the Central Coast Conference churches working to keep the promise of support made to IL Santa Cruz through time, talent, and treasure.
